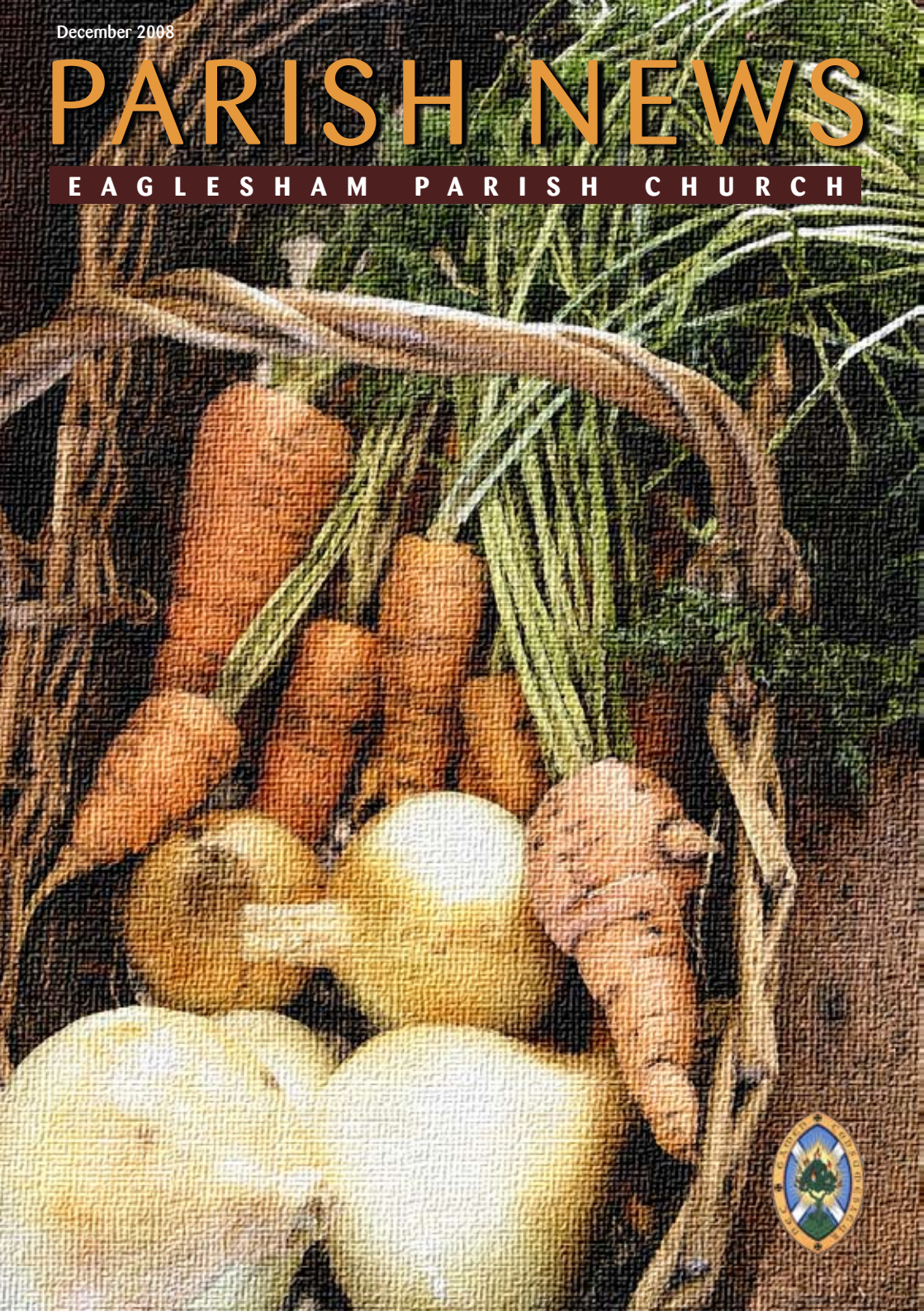

Mess, Stress and Christmas

Christmas 2008

I vividly remember a childhood Christmas visit to the theatre. It was an enthralling production for a little girl, and I gasped at the finale when a real coach carried on to the stage, drawn by two real ponies. At that magical moment some adults began to laugh, and I realised that one of the ponies, with fantasy-shattering realism, was depositing copious amounts of dung on the stage. It wasn't in the script (even Cinderella couldn't stop laughing), but it was an unforgettable climax.

Reality has a habit of intruding on all our Christmas dreams – but is that a bad thing? Someone said that 'A perfectly managed Christmas correct in every detail is a sure sign of someone who hasn't enough to do!' The panto pony reminds me of the neat and hygienic manger scenes so popular on Christmas cards – beautiful, but a fantasy which bears little resemblance to the mess and stress of the original

(complete with dung). Yet it was into that messy reality that Jesus, the only person ever able to choose where to be born, entered the world.

God still camouflages Himself like this. God is always found in the real, rather than the ideal, and often not at all where we expect Him. Christmas is never perfect, even if it's just that the fairy lights fuse. Maybe your Christmas this year will be far from your ideal in more serious ways – financial constraints, a family break-up, the loss of a loved one. And maybe you will find God strangely more present in it with you because of that.

May each of us see through the mess to the miracle at the heart of Christmas, and experience God with us in ways that are unexpected – but very real.

Kirk Session...

Someone recently remarked to me that he felt less informed about what was happening in the congregation since the introduction of the new team structure.

Somewhat taken aback by this statement I looked closely at the structure of our system and the progress which has been made since we decided to change it. In fact, the open and inclusive spirit self-evident throughout our teams is in stark contrast to much of the introspective discussion which occurred before within the Kirk Session and committees which must have seemed secretive and exclusive to many in the congregation. All teams include members of the congregation, in addition to just elders, and the important issues and points for further discussion at full Kirk Session level, which have originated within each team, are aired at joint meetings of the team conveners. The conveners' meeting is always minuted and it is the conveners' subsequent prerogative to report back to their respective team members everything of interest. Furthermore, Eaglesham has fully adopted the spirit and fact of the 'Church Without Walls' initiative and any member of the congregation who wants to attend a Kirk Session meeting can do so without fear or favour. In other words, there is no reason whatsoever why anyone in the congregation should feel either uninformed about what is happening on a week to week basis, or excluded from any aspect of our Church's life in which they would like to be a part.

A direct result of our Youth Strategy Team's foresight and understanding of a special need within our congregation has been the youthful presence in our midst of Russell Shields. We welcome Russell warmly and hope he will enjoy his first Christmas with us and we wish him well with his course of studies at the

International Christian College. We should support Russell in his work among us with our prayers and active encouragement.

Some special Services and events are planned from the end of November apart from the usual Christmas Services to which we all look forward and I hope as many of you as possible will be able to attend and enjoy them. Many of these are a result of the inspiration of our Teams and I would like to thank them for their consistent enthusiasm and hard work in bringing their ideas to fruition. They also deserve our support and encouragement in what they are doing on our behalf.

On behalf of our teams and Kirk Session I would like to wish all in the congregation and parish a very happy and peaceful Christmas and New Year.

Winter is upon us – the mole is somewhat indisposed but still functioning!

At the Church the new camera has been installed and is working well but requires minor adjustments to improve its picture quality. The stairwells are being repaired and repainted as has the vestry ceiling. The steeplejacks have returned to continue the remedial work on the steeple ‘leaks’.

The Mid Hall the entrance vestibule has been repainted.

The Carswell Hall wall movement has been monitored and a report commissioned and received from a structural engineer. His opinion is that our difficulty is coming from the foundations caused by the inability of roof and surface water to drain away. We will initially excavating a number of inspection holes to further investigate the problem. We have been aware of this issue for a number of years but as the widening gap is now affecting the false ceiling in the main hall remedial action is now required.

Work of a Youth Ministry Student...

It provides excellent opportunities to interact with the young people that would otherwise be difficult to create.

I've loved the interaction I've had with each of the groups and can't wait to further the involvement I have with them. Now that I've experienced the Afters group that goes on after a Second Sitting evening I am very excited about the involvement I can have in it and the other area that I am focusing on being more involved in is the Mearns Castle High School. The youth worker that already closely works with the school has been brilliant at helping me get involved with some things so far but I would really like to have a lot more involvement on a regular basis, which we are working towards.

With so much already going on it's been fantastic to see how it all fits together and I can't wait to what God has planned for the young people in Eaglesham. The more involved I get, the more involved I want to be and with so many ideas and possibilities available I can't help but look forward to what's to come.

Give Me Sanctuary? an old issue relevant to our church today...

Like the rest of you, I always find Lynn's sermons thought-provoking and challenging. 2 November was no different. Based on the parable of the Talents, we were asked to consider how we all make use of what we have and many recalled from family history the example of the 'good' front room being kept spotless for the important visitors who almost never came whilst the rest of the family lived cheek by jowl in the multi-purpose back room.

Then I thought, 'was I sitting in the front room?' Of course, in general terms, any congregation's greatest asset/talent is its people but in financial terms, the main asset/talent is its buildings. How well do we use our talents in Eaglesham? Our halls are lively and vibrant hives of activity for many hours each week but our sanctuary lies empty for most of the time. We all love the place where we meet to worship but is it our 'front room'? Should we be putting it to more regular use to further the work of the church and not just using it for worship? That seems to me to be

the natural logic flowing from the parable. So far so good, but now the crunch comes. In its present form the sanctuary is of limited use and might have to be changed. I've often thought the bravest decision taken since I came to Eaglesham was to radically alter the Carswell building from a church space with a sloping floor and fixed pews to a multi-purpose hall, transforming it from a place used by the (then) Sunday School once a week to a church and community facility. That must have been hard for those who were brought up in that church prior to the Union in 1960 with vivid memories of worshipping in the old Carswell Church. But they embraced the changes and now everyone sees the benefit of the new facility.

Could we do something similar with our sanctuary? Or is that a step too far? Our 'special guest' is in the Front Room all the time, perhaps it's a pity He's on His own so much.

Kirkyard Covenanter Memorial

In the north west corner of the kirkyard lies the monument to Gabriel Thomson and Robert Lockart who were murdered by the Stuart dragoons on 1 May 1685. The obelisk (pictured left) stands some 12 feet high and was erected in the middle of the 19th century. The inscription reads:

PSALM CXII & VI THE RIGHTEOUS SHALL BE IN EVERLASTING REMEMBRANCE

HERE LIE GABRIEL THOMSON AND ROBERT LOCKART WHO WERE KILLED FOR OUNING THE COVENANTED TESTIMONY BY A PARTY OF HIGHLANDMEN AND DRAGOONS UNDER THE COMMAND OF ARDENCAPLE 1ST MAY 1685.

THESE MEN DID SEARCH THROUGH MOORLAND MOSS TO FIND OUT ALL THAT HAD NOT PASS THESE FAITHFULL WITNESSES WERE FOUND AND MURDERED UPON THE GROUND THEIR BODIES IN THIS GRAVE DO LIE THEIR BLOOD FOR VENGEANCE YET DOTH CRY THIS MAY A STANDING WITNESS BE FOR PRESBYTERY GAINST PRELACY.



The Covenanters

Between 1638 and 1688, a bitter conflict was conducted between the supporters of the Stuart Kings who believed in the Divine Right of Royalty and the Covenanters who believed that Christ only was King. The Covenanters fought valiantly for religious and civil liberty and with the Glorious Revolution of 1688, the Presbyterian faith was re-established.

Many Covenanters suffered death, imprisonment or banishment to the Carolinas. Many more were fined. Almost three hundred known graves or memorials were established and the Scottish Covenanter Memorials Association was founded in 1966 to maintain and restore the burial sites. Most recently, as President, I have attended Conventicles (open air religious services) at Earnock, Hamilton and Starryshaw, Harthill where new memorials were installed to replace monuments destroyed by vandals.



The Millennium Conventicle

They came from Kilbride, Mearns, Eaglesham, Ayr and Fenwick. Two hundred folk attended the Millennium Conventicle at Millhouse Glen, Temples Farm on 3 September 2000. The congregation took part in a re-enactment of a Conventicle held there 325 years previously when the Rev John Blackadder preached a famous sermon on the text of Isaiah 53 in 1675.

The centre-piece of the service was conducted by the Rev Douglas Lamb (pictured), minister at Dalry. Three abiding memories for me are the score or so of people who walked from Eaglesham to attend exactly as the Covenanters would have done, the rumble of the waterfall immediately behind the Pulpit and the children's voices at the waterside evoking the sounds of yesteryear.
